

Dawn Carroll is the team leader of the group at Corwith that quickly sold 600 copies and profited \$3,000 to fund a student trip to Washington, D.C. "It's a high-quality book filled with 277 top recipes—some buyers are surprised it's less than \$10. It's mostly a matter of 'show and sell'."

This large book is filled with color photos and 277 recipes, each a family favorite selected from among over 34,000 recipes in a national contest. So each one is a "winner" on its own.

While some groups go doorto-door, others simply sell the

book at community gatherings such as church suppers, sporting events, band concerts, etc.

Others have had success staffing a small display at area grocery stores and local restaurants, where they post a sign stating, "FREE COOKIE with purchase of book".

Some have also asked beauty salons, barbershops, gift shops and even the local gas stations to help with sales. Each time we learn of new ideas like this, we add them to our "Sales Suggestions" list that's sent to new groups.
